

Task


- Individual play icons were arranged in the table in front of the students.

Questions for the students:


- · What kind of game are you playing?

- Before making their selection, students were to discuss each different option with the person next to them.







Task

- Students were shown found natural items from Cook & Phillip park (eg leaves, bark, sticks, gumnuts etc).
- Students were shown building materials that may be used at the park (eg concrete, softfall, timber etc).
- Students were asked to choose one natural or building material item each. After choosing, the student was asked to describe their item to the group and to explain one idea for something they could do with it.
- After the group had shared ideas together, students were given the task of working together to make a sculpture or artwork from their objects.

Additional questions were posed to the students:

- · What colour is it?
- · What does it smell like?
- · What is the texture? Eg. Rough or smooth?
- · Is it hard or soft?
- · What could you use it for?
- \cdot How does it make you feel?

Observations


Students engaged with the task individually and together.

Some students chose to build together, combining their individual ideas into shared creations. These became an assemblage of play opportunities, clocktowers, parkour areas and trees, inspired by previous activities.

Other students worked imaginatively by choosing to fully explore their own ideas and artworks individually. Detailed thought and care was placed into these creations.


Task
